WHAT IS THE 2011 PROGRAMMATIC AGREEMENT?

A collaboration between the Department of Defense (DOD), regulatory agencies, and other interested parties working together to protect and preserve important cultural and historic sites associated with the military relocation on Guam.

WHAT

Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 requires federal agencies to:

- consider effects of federally funded projects on historic properties
- engage in consultation with State Historic Preservation Officers (SHPO) and the public

The Programmatic Agreement (PA) is an agreed upon alternative consultation method under Section 106

WHY

Construction activities associated with the military relocation on Guam have the potential to impact cultural and historic sites.

The agreement provides guidance for:

- Management of Historic Properties
- Mitigation For Potential Adverse
 Effects to Historical Properties

Consultations under the PA identify mitigations to avoid or reduce negative impacts to cultural or historic sites

PROGRAMMATIC AGREEMENT PROCESSES

Programmatic Agreement Memo

For each construction project...

DOD provides PA Memo to the Public and Guam SHPO that includes project description and identification of historic properties



Guam SHPO and public provide comments

 Public can get PA Memo via CRI website and SHPO



DOD addresses Guam SHPO recommendations and Public comments




Additional consultation between DOD and Guam SHPO may be necessary to mitigate adverse effects

Archaeological Discoveries during Construction

Ground disturbing activities are monitored by an on-site Secretary of Interior qualified archaeologist

HUMAN REMAINS

Bone fragments are discovered



action

DOD follows standard operating procedures developed in consultation with Guam SHPO

DOD notifies Guam SHPO once procedures have been completed

HUMAN REMAINS

Burial site is discovered

DOD notifies Guam SHPO of description, location of the find, and proposed plan of action

DOD attempts to determine age and ethnicity

Determination of burial:

- 1. If modern, DOD reports to Navy Criminal Investigation Service
- 2. If Japanese WWII, DOD reports to Japanese Consulate of Guam
- 3. If American WWII, DOD notifies Defense POW/MIA Acct. Agency
- 4. If ancient CHamoru or unknown ethnicity, DOD consults w/ SHPO

DOD develops burial treatment plan in consultation with appropriate agency

ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITES

DOD notifies Guam SHPO and ACHP of description, location of the site, and plan to resolve effects of construction

Guam SHPO reviews and comments on the work plan

DOD addresses Guam SHPO recommendations

Additional consultation between DOD and Guam SHPO may occur to resolve SHPO concerns


Ancient CHamoru burials found during construction activities require consultation with Guam SHPO

- Agreed upon burial treatment plans preserve and protect burial sites
- Sabånan Fadang Burial Monument at Camp Blaz Main Cantonment
 - Completed in March 2022
 - Guam SHPO provided design for the walkway and commemorative plaque text
- Mogfog Burial Treatment Plans for Urban Training Complex at Andersen South


Construction project redesigns

- Building layouts at Main Cantonment to preserve multiple burials in place
- Project boundary for Water Well Fields at Andersen Air Force Base
- Road corridors at Urban Training Complex at Andersen South
- Road at Known Distance Rifle Range to preserve 6 archaeological sites

Northern Plateau Archaeology

Most archaeological sites date to Latte Period (800/1000 AD) to Post-contact (15th-17th century AD)

Changes in our understanding of prehistoric life on the Northern Plateau

- Ancient CHamoru people lived on the plateau on a more consistent or permanent basis
 - Cooking pits
 - Refuse deposits with items such as common marine food shells and animal bones, and the types of artifacts found include:
 - Lusong (grinding stone)
 - Ceramics
 - Shell and stone tools (for collecting & processing resources)
 - Burials are present

Ancient CHamoru people did not solely depend on coastal resources

- Evidence of relationships between inland plateau and coastal sites
 - Finished tridacna adzes may have been manufactured elsewhere and transported to the area
 - Common food shells and fish (found in refuse deposits) would have been collected from nearshore environments either through selfharvesting or trade

Ancient CHamoru traveled throughout Guam and the rest of the Marianas

- Ceramic and lithic studies demonstrate materials used to make pots and tools are more commonly found in Southern Guam and Saipan
 - Indicates these materials may have been made and transported elsewhere

Guam Synthesis is our 5-Year Compilation Report

Comprehensive review of archaeological reports and cultural resource data across the island and throughout time

Multi-component resource includes:


- GIS Geodatabase
- Pre-contact and Historic contents

A 2011 PA requirement that:

- Provides foundational data for Guam's prehistory and history
- Serves as a guide for historic preservation actions and research
- Improves cultural and historical interpretive support for Guam
- Updates completed every 5 years until PA expiration
 - First report was 2017

The Calendar Year 2022 report is underway and will include:

- Updated GIS database for the Guam SHPO
- Updated narrative and archaeological analyses based on archaeological surveys and projects conducted since 2016
- Will be publicly accessible on the Cultural Resources Information (CRI) Website
- Products will include:
 - Interpretive booklet
 - Portable teaching display kit
 - Visual media product





Visitors are permitted to collect non-protected plant material for:

Medicinal and herbal practitioners

High Value Trees are available for artisans

- Artisans must be acknowledged by Guam Council of Arts and Humanities
 - Includes wood carvers and canoe builders
- Materials include Ifit (Ifil wood), Lemmai (Breadfruit tree),
 Dukduk (Seeded breadfruit tree), and Yoga (Blue marble tree)
- There is an off-site storage location to pick-up materials




